Bryan D. moves to approve the minutes. Signe seconds. Unanimous approval.

**New business-** John LeJeune, the president of the Senate (5 minutes) to present a question for our consideration. Do our midterm grades and withdrawal policies have an impact on student retention? The Faculty Senate is asking for a proposal from CoAA on this issue. What should our policy be? Do we keep, abandon, or reform our current policies? In terms of withdrawal from class, students are withdrawing at a rate that is hurting their progression, so should we cap the number of withdrawals?
