Directions for Use

Instructors must fill out all areas down to the instructor signature line, including all course, student, and instructor information, as well as a description of the violation and the penalty imposed. Before filling the form with the Student Conduct Officer (Assistant Dean of Students), the faculty member should make an effort to contact the student, explain the situation, and obtain the student's signature on the form. Unauthorized collaboration includes giving your GeorgiaVIEW or GoVIEW login credentials to anyone; these credentials are for your use only (see also GSW Computer and Network Acceptable Use Policy section 4.7.1 Sharing of Access).

Policy on Building Access

Original:

Students wishing to access a building on campus after hours for study or class purposes must email the course instructor and administrative assistant for permission. They must state the date, time, names of students who will be in attendance, and reason for being in the building. The administrative assistant, after seeking permission from the dean, will alert campus security to the need to unlock the building for those students.

Proposed Change:

In the absence of an existing agreement between individual departments and the Office of Public Safety, students wishing to access a building on campus after hours for study or class purposes must ask the relevant course instructor and administrative assistant for written permission. After hours is defined as the time from when a specific building is locked by the Office of Public Safety to the time it is unlocked. The instructor must state the date, time, names of students who will be in attendance, and reason for students being in the building. The instructor will consult with the appropriate dean as needed.

Justification: Members of the subcommittee who spoke up felt that the original policy was too restrictive. This policy seeks to balance department academic needs and university security needs.

Faculty use of self-authored text books

Original:

All information required for ordering educational materials should be submitted to institutional bookstores. Exceptions can be approved at the departmental level. The institutional bookstore will distribute lists of these educational materials to private competitors. Recommendations to students, as to source for materials, should not list one supplier over another.

1. There are no restrictions on the adoption of textbook materials written by faculty members. Prior to the adoption of a textbook, approval must be obtained from a departmental committee. The existence of such a committee is necessary to prevent any possible conflicts of interest. Faculty should send a request to the department chair which includes the course being taught, the book to be used, and a rationale for why the self-authored book is the best choice. The request should also indicate how the faculty member will ensure they receive no financial gain from student use of the book. *For example, the author will calculate the amount of royalties that would be received from the use of the materials and donate that amount to GSW Foundation account of their choosing.*
2. No faculty member may charge/collect remuneration for educational materials directly from the students.

3. If any conflict of interest arises as a result of sales of textbooks or other educational materials, the Vice President for Academic Affairs, in consultation with the Deans Council, Faculty Senate, and Student Government, will appoint a committee to hear the case and advise the Vice President for Academic Affairs on a course of action.
4. Copyright clearance must be obtained by the issuing department or faculty, where necessary, for compilations to be sold through institutional bookstores. Institutional and System general counsel may insist on this process.
5. Royalties may not be paid to individual faculty for compilations he/she produces for copy and resale through an institutional bookstore.”

Justification: This incorporates Dr. Suzanne Smith’s suggestion. There was no objection by email to the change by any of the subcommittee members. It is the same text as the original, without the following sentence: “For example, the author will calculate the amount of royalties that would be received from the use of the materials and donate that amount to GSW Foundation account of their choosing.”

Audit Policy

Original:

A student must have permission from the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs to audit a course. Auditors are expected to attend classes, but they are not required to take examinations or meet course requirements. No credit is given for audits. In the event of overloaded classes, students enrolled for credit will be given preference. Fees for attending class on an audit basis are calculated on the same schedule as regular academic fees.

Proposed Change:

A student auditing a course is not required to take examinations or meet course requirements beyond attendance. No credit is awarded for audited courses. To audit a course, a student must have permission from the course instructor, who will notify the Office of the Registrar once permission to audit is given. The student approved to audit a course will be registered by the Office of the Registrar, but an auditor's registration will only be provisional until the last day to add courses since preference in registration will be given to students taking a course for credit. Tuition and fees for auditing courses are the same as those for taking courses for credit.

Other: This proposed update modernizes the Exercise Science curriculum, better aligning it with the program architectures at competitive institutions. Notably, this includes the removal of health courses in favor of laboratory sections, a research methods course, and an additional elective slot. More significantly, this also better aligns the degree requirements with the career and/or post-graduate expectations and requirements to which our students are held.

The addition of laboratory sections to several of our courses provides hands-on experience that is otherwise lacking from the curriculum due to the constraints of trying to combine both lecture and laboratory materials into single 3-credit courses.

“Introduction to Physical Education” is replaced by “Introduction to Exercise Science” to provide our students with a better-tailored early education on the types of career paths they could take within the major. Nutrition is also brought into the major to allow closer integration with the rest of the curriculum.

The addition of an advisor-approved elective slot and the research methods course helps to address the diversity of career paths after graduation. In conjunction with their advisors, the additional elective allows more flexibility in tailoring course selections towards specific needs. Additionally, research methods is intended to help students build the skills for directed and critical further learning in their chosen fields, both during their time here and after they have left GSW.



Service learning hours are required. (1-2-2)

Other: **LEAD 2020 is a two-hour course that will be required for participants in the President Carter Leadership Program (PCLP). These students will be taking 6 additional LEAD courses over their four years at GSW. Including LEAD 2020 in Area B will help to keep down tuition costs for these students as they use the course to meet their degree requirements. In addition, LEAD 2020 will be open to all GSW students, providing a foundation for leadership and future careers even though they are not in the PCLP. Because it is a two-hour course, students who earn 11 hours in Area D will now have a way to earn only the four required hours for Area B. Currently, that is not possible unless they do a minimum 20-day study abroad trip to earn two credits in INTL 2000.**

Proposed Faculty Work Policy

Georgia Southwestern State University recognizes three key areas of Faculty Work to provide a framework for establishing performance expectations for individual faculty members. These key areas are **Teaching, Service, and Scholarship-Creative Activity**. The ratio of any one of these **three** areas to the other **two** may vary between or within academic units; therefore, each academic unit must establish at least one set of typical expectations for its faculty members that defines how each of the three key areas of faculty work apply within that academic unit. Each unit's set of typical work expectations will be recorded in a document called a Faculty Work Profile that will be kept on file in both the unit administrative files and the Office of Academic Affairs. The Faculty Work Profile will be used as a guideline during yearly evaluations and decisions of promotion and tenure. Each unit may have its own guidelines for promotion and tenure that outline specific expectations for each level of promotion and/or tenure, however those guidelines should align with the Faculty Work Profile for each faculty member.

Since GSW is primarily a teaching institution, the majority of any fulltime faculty member's work will be teaching. Expectations must be established in all key areas for all types of fulltime faculty including tenured, tenure-track, non-tenured, and visiting faculty of whatever rank. In units with department chairs, teaching expectations for each department chair must be defined by the unit's academic dean.

The standard guidelines for fulltime teaching at the undergraduate level per semester for tenured, tenure-track, and visiting faculty with the rank of assistant professor or above are as follows: lecture courses (12 credit hours), studio art classes (9 credit hours, which are equivalent to 18 contact hours), lab sciences (12 contact hours), and music (12 contact hours.) Additionally, fulltime teaching for all ranks of lecturers is twelve to fifteen (12-15) credit hours. Class size standards and best practices are defined by each unit in the work profiles. The standard guideline for fulltime teaching at the graduate level is nine (9) credit hours per semester. If a unit awards graduate degrees, it must establish a set of comparative expectations for graduate and undergraduate teaching to guide teaching assignments that include a mix of undergraduate and graduate teaching. All units must define overload teaching and establish reasonable limits on annual overloads. Overload limits and expectations are established and apply not only to teaching at GSW, but also to teaching for eCore or for any other USG or non-USG institution. Faculty members teaching for institutions other than GSW, including eCore, must receive permission from his or her academic unit and the Office of Academic Affairs prior to any term in which he or she wishes to teach elsewhere, ideally before GSW class schedules are set.

Each academic unit must establish expectations for the service expected of faculty members. For faculty members who are not eligible for tenure, service may not be expected depending upon the nature of the appointment. Expectations will be established by units. Each unit may consider departmental service, service to the larger university community, and community service, if any.

Each GSW fulltime faculty member regardless of rank is expected at a minimum to remain current in both the content and the pedagogy of his or her area of expertise. Each unit may establish expectations for Scholarship or Creative Work beyond this minimum expectation. In addition, each unit must define the nature of acceptable Scholarship or Creative Work, such as peer-reviewed publications or professional exhibitions or performances. If the expectations differ for

faculty members at different points in the tenure, promotion, or post-tenure process, those expectations must be articulated in the unit's Faculty Work Profile(s).

The Office of Academic Affairs is responsible for determining a timeline for establishing and reviewing Faculty Work Profiles. The Faculty Affairs committee will develop a consistent format for the profile documents. Initial profiles and any subsequent changes to a unit's profiles must be approved by the Dean, with final approval by the Provost.

Current Faculty Workload Policy (to be replaced by the proposed policy)

Full-time faculty workload shall be considered the equivalent of a forty-hour work week and shall consist of teaching load, office hours, service, and scholarship. In accordance with Regents Policy 301, the normal teaching load for faculty will be 12 semester credit hours per week for¹ tenure track personnel and 12 to 15 semester credit hours per week for all ranks of lecturers.²

Variations to the requirement above are possible. Academic deans and department chairs are responsible for scheduling courses and assigning faculty loads must insure that sufficient courses are scheduled to meet student needs and that faculty are assigned to staff those courses. Deans and chairs are also responsible for understanding the relationship of student loads and semester credit hours generated within the University System funding formula. With these factors in mind, academic deans and department chairs may adjust workloads as follows:

1. Faculty members who teach courses requiring laboratory or studio work may be assigned a course load based on 12 student contact hours per week.
2. Physical Education activity courses may be considered in the load for appropriate faculty on a 12 hour per week contact basis.
3. Nine semester credit hours of only graduate courses may be considered a full load.
4. Release time may be granted for professional activity such as:
 - a. Administrative responsibilities
 - b. Research
 - c. Grant proposal writing
 - d. Implementation of a funded grant
 - e. Special assignments within a department, school or the University.

Department chairs are allowed one-fourth release time from teaching duties for department leadership and administration during the regular academic year.

Any variation from the assignment of a normal teaching load of 12 semester credit hours must be approved, in advance of implementation, by the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Faculty Work Profile Guidelines

A unit will be defined as a College, School or Department.

A unit is only required to submit one Faculty Work Profile. However, a unit may choose to submit multiple profiles for specific ranks of faculty or for other variations, such as teaching, scholarship/creative work, or service-heavy profile. If a unit has one generic profile, the percentage of time of a standard 40-hour work week will be assumed to be 65% for Teaching, 20% for Scholarship/Creative Work, and 15% for Service. If a unit chooses to have profiles with different emphasis on teaching, scholarship-creative work, and service, the profile will include descriptions of those expectations. Advising is vital to the university's mission and therefore should be considered a high priority when creating the work profile.

Development of the Faculty Work Profile should include input from the faculty member if the faculty member is currently a member of the unit. If a faculty member is dissatisfied with the proposed Faculty Work Profile, he or she may follow the standard academic grievance procedures as outlined in section II of the Faculty Handbook.

Teaching Expectations

- The definition of fulltime teaching should be expressed in credit hours, contact hours, or some combination expected per ten-month contract.
- Annual limit on overloads should be expressed in the same way as fulltime teaching, i.e., credit hours, contact hours, etc. per ten months. Faculty will not be required to carry an overload.
- If there are any other expectations related to teaching, they should be listed.
- All teaching faculty will be required to comply with the duties outlined in the Faculty Handbook for teaching. (See Handbook Section V "Required Information Provided on Course Syllabus", "Class Rolls/Class Size", "Assignment of Grades")

Scholarship-Creative Work Expectations

- All fulltime GSW faculty of whatever rank are expected to remain current in both the content and the pedagogy of his or her area of expertise.
- If a unit has no expectations beyond the minimum, this section of the profile need not be filled in.
- If a unit has additional expectations in this area, there should be a detailed description of what type of scholarly or creative output will fulfill the expectations.

Service Expectations

- Unit Service consists of unit committee, assessment, and curriculum work, as well as any other administrative responsibilities that are needed to run the unit.
- All faculty members are expected to engage in a minimum Service to the University by working on committees. Units need not fill out this section of the profile unless the unit expects more than the minimum service to the University.
- Units are free to set expectations for Community Service or not as the unit sees fit. However, the University will value the contributions of Faculty in the service to the community, if any.
- Advisement will be considered as the service of aiding students to register for classes in such a way as to allow students to complete their degrees within a reasonable time.
- Advising will be considered as guiding the student with regard to their professional, extracurricular, scholarly, or educational development.
- Advising expectations may be expressed as an average number of advisees, or as a percentage of time. For example, a profile may stipulate that 5% of the workload will be devoted to Advising time.

Suggested changes for Spring 2019 approval are **bold underline, yellow highlight**. **Bold underline with no highlight** marks changes approved in Fall 2018 to the Faculty Handbook due to addition of the Faculty Development Committee as a new standing faculty committee (Spring general faculty meeting June 2018) and revisions to Provost and VPAA position:

Faculty Development Grants

Based on the recommendations of the **Faculty Development Committee**, a budget has been established in the Office of the **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs** to award grants for individual faculty development. The **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs** will receive the proposals and pass them to the **Faculty Development Committee**. All proposals will be reviewed by **this** Committee. The chair of the Committee will compile the results of the review process and submit the results to the **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs**, who will be responsible for final decisions on funding.

I. To facilitate the review process, the proposals submitted should use the “Faculty Development Grant Proposal” form found in the Appendix, including a Budget and Project Description describing how the project will benefit the University. The evaluation criteria given below should be addressed in this section.

Administrators at all levels and the faculty share a common concern that opportunities for and in support of faculty development be high priority at the University. The emphasis of the program should be individual development broadly defined. A few examples of the many possible projects are:

- a. Research projects
- b. Organizing professional meetings and seminars
- c. Academic service to the community
- d. Productive participation in professional meetings
- e. Faculty development time (released time)

II. The following guidelines have been proposed by the Faculty Affairs Committee and **amended by the Faculty Development Committee (2019)**:

- a. To insure wide distribution of funds, funding is limited to two grants per fiscal year. While the faculty member's enthusiasm should not be limited, first-time applicants will take priority over those requesting a second research grant in the same fiscal year.
- b. These funds should be reserved for use when departmental, school, and outside funds are not available.
- c. Innovative and original research, which is related to a faculty member's teaching discipline is encouraged and supported within reason of available funds. Funds may be used to pay student help, buy small items of specialized equipment, provide copies of hard-to-find literature sources, or cover travel to field sites, libraries, or other such facilities.
- d. To encourage growth and professional stature, travel grants will be funded when possible to any recognized professional activity in which the faculty member is a **productive** participant (i.e., an organizer, speaker, society officer, etc.). **Travel funds are limited to**

- ~~80% of the estimated cost, the remainder to be borne by the faculty member as evidence of his/her sincere interest in this activity.~~ Passive participation (i.e., as a member of the audience), while encouraged, is not under the faculty development grant program.
- e. To assure the wise administration of these funds, a short summary of the funded activity must be sent to the **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs** after completion. Failure to submit a summary will result in not funding future proposals.
- f. All changes in the Faculty Development Grants guidelines must be approved by a majority of the faculty at a faculty meeting.

III. The criteria for the evaluation of proposals by the **Faculty Development Committee** are as follows:

a. General Procedure

1. All **Faculty Development Committee** members will read the proposals.
2. ~~Score each proposal on a basis of 1-10.~~
2. Recommend percentage funding for each proposal.
3. **Faculty Affairs Development Committee** members with applications in review will not vote on their own proposals.
4. The budget allocated for Faculty Development Grants will be provided to the Committee at the beginning of each fiscal year by the Office of the **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs**.
5. The Office of the **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs** will notify the Committee in writing of the names and amounts of awards. A brief statement will accompany this notification explaining the rationale for award amounts differing from those recommended by the Committee.
6. The Committee will provide each applicant denied funding a brief statement explaining the rationale for denial.

b. General Guidelines

1. Review original guidelines on file with proposals.
2. Must demonstrate all other funding sources exhausted (department, school, outside grants, etc.)

c. Criteria for Travel Expenses to **Professional Conferences Meetings**

1. **Meeting Conference** sponsored by recognized professional society or of demonstrated significance.
2. **Meeting Conference** should be pertinent to applicant's teaching or research field.
3. Funding is restricted to applicants who are actively participating in **meetings conferences** (organizer, officer, speaker, etc.).
4. Includes a detailed budget with brief, itemized justification.

d. Criteria for Attendance at **Training Seminars and Workshops Short Courses**

Relevant to applicant's teaching and/or research or to departmental goals, i.e., learning for new course offerings or course expansion.

e. Criteria for Research Proposals

1. Literature search demonstrates project is original.
2. Significance or importance of project is demonstrated.
3. Applicant proposes a practical, manageable plan.

4. Includes a detailed budget with brief, itemized justification.

f. Criteria for Funding

The following represent the normal maximum allowed for Faculty Development Grants by category of proposal. The actual amounts awarded are subject to the availability of funds and the recommendations of the Faculty Development Committee.

a. Professional Conference Presentations & Professional Conference Productive Participation--\$1400

The Faculty Development Committee shall interpret the appropriate funding level to be that which provides the highest level of funding possible based on the location of the conference and the nature of the conference. The awarding of actual amount awarded is subject to availability of funds and the discretion of the Faculty Affairs Development Committee.

¹ These represent the maximum amount that can be requested. The awarding of actual amount awarded is subject to availability of funds and the discretion of the Faculty Affairs Development Committee.

² The Faculty Development Committee shall interpret the appropriate funding level to be that which provides the highest level of funding possible based on the location of the conference and the nature of the conference. This limit does not override the aforementioned 80% of total cost limit on travel funds.

¹ The Faculty Development Committee is allowed to make judgments concerning the definition of "Southeast" but the norm shall be conferences in Tennessee, South Carolina, Alabama, Georgia, and Northern Florida are within the "Southeast".

-an international or national conference taking place within the state of Georgia shall have a maximum funding award of \$1400

-a Mid-West regional conference shall have a maximum funding award of \$1200

-a California state conference shall have a maximum funding award of \$1400

-a regional conference located in South Carolina shall have a maximum funding award of \$1000

-a state conference located in Athens, Georgia shall have a maximum funding award of \$600

b. Research \$700

c. Academic Supplies (related to innovative teaching projects) \$200

d. Attendance at Training Seminars (based on availability of funds and documentation as to how this training will benefit the University) ~~\$150~~ \$300

e. Permit the above maximum permissible allocations to be exceeded if funding is available and project shows exceptional merit.

In case of faculty development time in lieu of teaching, the following guidelines have been established and approved by the faculty:

1. It is imperative that faculty understand that development time does not automatically accrue but will be obtained only after submission and approval of a suitable project. Additionally, faculty must understand that the general needs of the institution or their respective department will be taken into account prior to granting individual development time.
2. To apply for faculty development time in lieu of teaching, a faculty member must submit a written proposal for a specific activity, which will aid his/her development as a professional and/or an educator.
3. A faculty member may apply for faculty development time in lieu of teaching load typically not to exceed one three or four hour course per academic year, nor three such courses in a three-year period.

4. Applications should be submitted through the department chair/academic dean for endorsement to the **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs** who, in turn, will solicit the recommendation of the **Faculty Development Committee**. The Committee will examine the proposal's professional merit and other pertinent information and make recommendations to the **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs** to aid in his/her decision. When necessary, the Committee will solicit the advice of specialists in the area of the proposal. The **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs**, however, will make the final decision as to whether the proposal is approved.

5. The **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs** enlists the cooperation of academic deans and department chairs in scheduling classes such that time for approved faculty development projects may be made available.

Faculty Instructional Grants

The Faculty Instructional Grant (FIG) will provide funding for exceptional one-time purchases of long-term use instructional resources. The **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs** (VPAA) will receive proposals for FIGs from faculty and deliver copies of the proposals to the **Faculty Development Committee**; The **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs** will inform the Committee of the funding level available for the FIGs. The Committee will review all proposals and submit recommendations to the **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs** concerning approval and funding levels for all proposals. The **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs** is responsible for final decisions and notification of approved grants. The deadline for proposals, reimbursement of approved grants and implementation of grants will be set at the discretion of the **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs**. Procedures regarding verification of implementation of grants will be set at the discretion of the **Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs**.

- I. The following guidelines apply to the approval of FIG proposals;
 - a. Funding for the expenses in the proposal must be unavailable through normal GSW or outside funding sources, including the procedures in Section IV(S) of the Faculty Handbook.
 - b. FIGs may not be used for funding of proposals where funding would be available through Faculty Development Grants. This includes but is not limited to travel expenses, faculty research, and training seminars **and small academic supply purchases allowed under Faculty Development Grants**.
 - c. Faculty members are limited to one FIG per academic year.
 - d. The format and required information contained in FIG proposals will be established by and amended at the discretion of the **Faculty Development Committee**.

Faculty Development Grants

Based on the recommendations of the Faculty Affairs Committee, a budget has been established in the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs to award grants for individual faculty development. The Vice President will receive the proposals and pass them to the Faculty Affairs Committee. All proposals will be reviewed by the Committee. The chair of the Committee will compile the results of the review process and submit the results to the Vice President, who will be responsible for final decisions on funding.

To facilitate the review process, the proposals submitted should use the "Faculty Development Grant Proposal" form found in the Appendix, including a Budget and Project Description

describing how the project will benefit the University. The evaluation criteria given below should be addressed in this section.

Administrators at all levels and the faculty share a common concern that opportunities for and in support of faculty development be high priority at the University. The emphasis of the program should be individual development broadly defined. A few examples of the many possible projects are

1. Research projects
2. Organizing professional meetings and seminars
3. Academic service to the community
4. Productive participation in professional meetings
5. Faculty development time (released time)

The following guidelines have been proposed by the Faculty Affairs Committee:

1. To insure wide distribution of funds, funding is limited to two grants per fiscal year. While the faculty member's enthusiasm should not be limited, first-time applicants will take priority over those requesting a second research grant in the same fiscal year.
2. These funds should be reserved for use when departmental, school, and outside funds are not available.
3. Innovative and original research which is related to a faculty member's teaching discipline is encouraged and supported within reason of available funds. Funds may be used to pay student help, buy small items of specialized equipment, provide copies of hard-to-find literature sources, or cover travel to field sites, libraries, or other such facilities.
4. To encourage growth and professional stature, travel grants will be funded when possible to any recognized professional activity in which the faculty member is a **productive** participant (i.e., an organizer, speaker, society officer, etc.). Travel funds are limited to 80% of the estimated cost, the remainder to be borne by the faculty member as evidence of his/her sincere interest in this activity. Passive participation (i.e., as a member of the audience), while encouraged, is not under the faculty development grant program.

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5. To assure the wise administration of these funds, a short summary of the funded activity must be sent to the Vice President for Academic Affairs after completion. Failure to submit a summary will result in not funding future proposals.
6. All changes in the Faculty Development Grants guidelines must be approved by a majority of the faculty at a faculty meeting.

The criteria for the evaluation of proposals by the Faculty Affairs Committee are as follows:

1. General Procedure
 1. All Faculty Affairs Committee members will read the proposals.
 2. Score each proposal on a basis of 1-10.
 3. Recommend percentage funding for each proposal.
 4. Faculty Affairs Committee members with applications in review will not vote on their own proposals.
 5. The budget allocated for Faculty Development Grants will be provided to the Committee at the beginning of each fiscal year by the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs.
 6. The Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs will notify the Committee in writing of the names and amounts of awards. A brief statement will accompany

this notification explaining the rationale for award amounts differing from those recommended by the Committee.

7. The Committee will provide each applicant denied funding a brief statement explaining the rationale for denial.
2. General Guidelines
 1. Review original guidelines on file with proposals.
 2. Must demonstrate all other funding sources exhausted (department, school, outside grants, etc.)
 3. Results of any previous Faculty Development Grants must be on file with the Vice President for Academic Affairs.
3. Criteria for Travel Expenses to Meetings
 1. Meeting sponsored by recognized professional society or of demonstrated significance.
 2. Meeting should be pertinent to applicant's teaching or research field.
 3. Funding is restricted to applicants who are actively participating in meetings (organizer, officer, speaker, etc.).
 4. Includes a detailed budget with brief, itemized justification.
4. Criteria for Attendance at Short Courses

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Relevant to applicant's teaching and/or research or to departmental goals, i.e., learning for new course offerings or course expansion.

5. Criteria for Research Proposals
 1. Literature search demonstrates project is original.
 2. Significance or importance of project is demonstrated.
 3. Applicant proposes a practical, manageable plan.
 4. Includes a detailed budget with brief, itemized justification.

¹These represent the maximum amount that can be requested. The awarding of actual amount awarded is subject to availability of funds and the discretion of the Faculty Affairs Committee.

²The Faculty Affairs Committee shall interpret the appropriate funding level to be that which provides the highest level of funding possible based on the location of the conference and the nature of the conference. This limit does not override the aforementioned 80% of total cost limit on travel funds. The Faculty Affairs Committee is allowed to make judgments concerning the definition of "Southeast" but the norm shall be conferences in Tennessee, South Carolina, Alabama, Georgia, and Northern Florida are within the "Southeast".

Examples:

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- an international or national conference taking place within the state of Georgia shall have a maximum funding award of \$1400
- a Mid-West regional conference shall have a maximum funding award of \$1400 -a California state conference shall have a maximum funding award of \$1400
- a regional conference located in South Carolina shall have a maximum funding award of \$1000
- a state conference located in Athens, Georgia shall have a maximum funding award of \$600
- b. Research-\$700
- c. Academic Supplies (related to innovative teaching projects)-\$200
- d. Attendance at Training Seminars (based on availability of funds and documentation as to how this training will benefit the University)-\$150
- e. Permit the above maximum permissible allocations to be exceeded if funding is available and project shows exceptional merit.
